#### Meetings of Church Council for June 10, July 8, and August 12, 2014

In an effort to keep the congregation informed this is a brief summary of items discussed during the monthly Church Council Meeting,

#### June

Council welcomed Jane Moran, our summer intern.

Council approved spending \$10,000 from the Designated Youth Endowment Fund to cover airfare and other expenses for the South Dakota mission trip this summer.

The Moderator presented a schedule of listening sessions to be conducted by the Planning Task Force (PTF) over the summer.

Council accepted a bequest from the estate of Dirk Davenport. Dirk grew up in the church. The bequest was a book titled *The Annals of Brookfield: The 150<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of the Congregational Church of Brookfield.* 

CIS's theme for the coming year will be Mental Health. CIS will hold a sandwich-making session to assist the Loaves & Fishes food program. Sandwiches will be assembled after 10:30 worship on the first Sunday of each month.

In May, Welcome committee hosted breakfast for the confirmands, helped Fellowship with the Fair-field East Association (FEA) meeting and dinner, and handed out bubbles at the Memorial Day Parade.

The Worship committee discussed the sandwich board. General practice is to use it only for special announcements such as the Thrift Shop, and for no more than a few days, in consideration of aesthetic objections.

#### July

Heather Berner resigned in June as Church School Coordinator. The Personnel and Christian Education committees is beginning the search for a new Coordinator.

The Moderator announced "Welcome" as the church's theme for the coming year. Council discussed ways to incorporate "welcome" into upcoming programs. The Planning Task Force has begun compiling the data collected at June listening sessions.

The "For All the Saints" Capital Campaign's books were officially closed, leaving \$82,440 unspent. The congregation will vote in the future to decide how the remaining funds will be spent, relying partially on recommendations from the PTF.

Council approved increasing the fee charged to families for a memorial reception coordinator from \$100 to \$175.

The Christian Education committee took over from the Worship Committee the hosting of Wednesday campfires. They were to be held July 9, 16, 25 & 30.

Church House: Legal and insurance conflicts in the Ross Solar contract were resolved.

Church in Society raised \$1,750 from the June 14th Thrift Shop. CIS will give \$1,000 to the youth mission trip and the balance to Brookfield Social Services.

Council approved Pastor Whipple's request to spend \$1,150 from the Christian Growth and Enrichment Fund to provide scholarship assistance to youth and adults participating in the summer mission trip.

#### **Church Council Notes (cont.)**

#### August

In order to acquaint church members with the various committees and their functions, one committee will be highlighted each month. During each committee's month they will host a coffee hour, speak during service and write pieces for CrossWays and the weekly bulletin.

The Personnel and CE committees presented a draft description of the Church School Coordinator position. The job description is posted, and the position is open to all church members, including those with daytime jobs.

Council was asked to consider moving the date of the Yankee Fair on week up or back starting in 2015 due to a conflict with the date of the Connecticut Conference Annual Meeting. Every year the pastors must choose whether to attend the Fair or the Conference. Council will vote on the change in September.

The Treasurer reported pledge income was down only \$5,000 from budget this month, which is better, compared to this time of year in previous years. The improvement in cash flow is in part a result of more people using Vanco (on-line giving) to remit their pledge.

Pastor Whipple expects to return \$300 to the Christian Growth and Enrichment Fund and \$1,000 or more to the Youth Endowment Fund. Jennifer deserves recognition for her skillful management of the mission trip's finances.

Investment Treasurer's Report: As of June 30 the market value of the Endowment Fund (General and Designated) is \$1,167,017.

Council approved the following as recipients of 2014 Yankee Fair Funds: Silver Lake Conference Center, ARC (Association of Religious Communities), Simply Smiles, Refugee Resettlement. Church in Society will decide how the funds will be allocated among the groups.

The Church House Committee reminds all members and groups that the Parsonage is available for church meetings and events. Please speak to Jeannine in the main office to book usage of the Parsonage.

Council approved accepting a granite handicapped parking marker which will be donated by Larry Ruschmeyer. The marker will be installed at the handicapped parking spot by the Memorial Garden.

The Worship committee has re-named REACH "the Media Team" and discussed the need to update our audio/visual equipment. The committee will submit a written proposal to Council and may request permission to hire a sound consultant to advise on what acoustical improvements should be made.

Council approved high school sophomore Jill DeLucia to serve as a youth deacon. Council thanks Tom Young for coordinating Greeters for the 10:30 service. He would like to expand the effort to the 8:30 service as well.

Sunday School starts on September 7. The Christian Education committee will add Welcome and Mental Health themes to the curriculum.

The mission trip Stockholders Breakfast will be held on September 21 in between Sunday morning services, the day the SYF leads worship to share experiences from their trip to South Dakota. Pastor Whipple thanks everyone for supporting the youth mission trip.

Church Council Meetings are open to all and are scheduled for the second Tuesday of the month at 7:00 in Brooks Hall. If you would like to have something put on the agenda for a Church Council meeting please contact Nancy Vodra, Moderator or Dave Goral, Vice Moderator.

#### This month's featured program is the Nyaka AIDS Orphans Program

In rural Uganda, more than 2 million children have been orphaned by HIV/AIDS and most are being raised by their grandmothers. The <a href="Nyaka AIDS Orphans Program">Nyaka AIDS Orphans Program</a>'s Training of Trainers program provides resources to these grandmothers to equip them with the business, life, and empowerment skills necessary to improve their lives and the lives of the children in their care.

The peer-to-peer training programs that our \$45,000 grant will fund are aimed at improving life skills, helping the grandmothers secure micro-finance loans to encourage economic stability, and to teach them to cope better with being elderly and poor raising small children. More than 273 trainers will be trained and a total of 7,000 women and 43,000 children will be directly impacted.

Here is a brief status on the solar system installation approved by the Congregation at the annual meeting in April 2014:

- We have hired a contract attorney to represent our interests, and he has reviewed and modified the contract wording to better protect us. A draft copy of the contract has been distributed to the Church House committee, Moderator, and Vice Moderator for review. A small stumbling block involving insurance questions in the contract wording was addressed by both the contractor's and our insurance company. My expectation that these issues would be resolved by the end of June did not pan out. However, as I write this in August, the issues have been resolved, and we are now in the process of getting the final version of the written contract completed.
- A completed written document will be submitted to the Church House Committee and Moderator for final review and approval.
- I anticipate having a signed contract sometime in September.
- The contractor, Ross Solar LLC, has completed design work and is ready to submit the design for engineering and regulatory review upon contract signing.
- I do not yet have an estimate as to when the system will be installed.

We will keep you informed of the progress on this project.

# Church In Society Committee Update

CIS has been busy this summer.....

Our **Annual Thrift Shop** in June was a success once again. Thrift shop funds of over \$1,700 were disbursed to Brookfield social services as well as to the SYF mission trip to South Dakota. The unsold clothing was donated to The Bridgeport Homeless Veterans, TBICO—an organization that assists unemployed women with clothing for interviews and employment, and we also had The Grady family come and pick up clothing for children in an orphanage in Honduras.

CIS's **focus theme** for this year is "Mental Health." We are working on providing programs and resources to go along with our theme. We hope you saw our sources regarding services surrounding Mental Health issues in our weekly worship bulletins this summer.

On August 24th the "Ben's Bells" Painting Party was a success. The Ben's Bells Project seeks to promote kindness in order to grow happier healthier communities.

On the 1st Sunday of the month we are making **lunches for Loaves and Fishes**, directly following service. Join us on September 7th ( and on the first Sunday of each month) in the Creation Station at 11:30am for our next opportunity.

Finally, the Church in Society Committee made recommendations to Council in August regarding the 50% of our **Yankee Fair Funds** that go to outreach projects in our community and beyond. The recommendations made to and accepted by Council were for the funds to be given to:

- Refugee Resettlement Ministry—our own ministry program helping to resettle refugees from around the world.
- The Association of Religious Communities (ARC)—serving the Greater Danbury Area with issues of homelessness and housing, food insecurity, domestic violence, building relationships between communities of faith, strengthening the community, and more.
- Silver Lake Conference Center—our CT Conference Outdoor Ministries Center that has served
  a number of our church family members as they have participated in summer camp weeks, served
  on Camp Staff, participated in Men's Retreats and service projects, the Annual Women's Retreat,
  and Confirmation Retreats.
- Simply Smiles—a CT based nonprofit whose mission it is to bring smiles to children whose lives might otherwise seem incredibly bleak. Members of our church have served with Simply Smiles in Oaxaca, Mexico and the surrounding communities and on the Lakota Sioux Reservation in South Dakota.

This multi-level recommendation will help us serve our church ministries, our local communities, youth and adults throughout the state who attend meaningful events at Silver Lake, and beyond into the United States and the world. What better way is there to share our Fair Funds in this year when our Yankee Fair theme is "Mission Possible," focusing on the many ways God calls us to use our gifts in service locally and out in the world.

# Planning Task Force Update

Dear Friends,

Our CCB Church Council has charged the Planning Task Force Committee (PTF) to use our church mission and vision to develop a 3-year action plan to meet the expected ministry needs of our church and community for the future, as well as lay the groundwork to establish a Long-Range Planning Committee.

We have been meeting nearly every Thursday night since the end of January 2014. Last winter, we began working together to better understand our objectives, and set a timeline for what we hope will be a year-long process. During this spring and summer our PTF has planned and held 10 listening sessions with the congregation, after rolling out and testing our process at the All-Church Leadership Retreat on May 10.

We are grateful to have had the opportunity to hear what you are thinking about the current state of our church, and to brainstorm together about our top priorities for future mission and ministry — both in spiritual terms and in relation to specific concerns about our physical campus. We have been inspired to hear your passions for putting faith into action, in spite of certain financial challenges that remain before us.

We have had a good response, from a percentage standpoint; about 13 percent of the congregation has participated. The committee, while very appreciative of all those who have taken the time to meet with us, is concerned that this number, while significant, is still a small percentage.

We understand that the summer months are a difficult time to reach everyone so we are continuing our efforts both through emails and an additional listening session. We will have listening session feedback forms available at both Sunday, September 7<sup>th</sup> worship services for those who would like to take them home. We ask that you fill out the form and return it to us by Friday, September 12<sup>th</sup>. It can be given to anyone on the committee or dropped off or mailed to the church office. Or you can request an online version of the form from our PTF email: planning@uccb.org. You may send us questions or ideas at that address as well.

On Saturday, September 13th, the PTF will hold its final listening session from 9:30-10:30am in Fellowship Hall. Then the PTF will be ready to begin prayerfully discerning and creating a recommended strategic plan for presentation to Council, including (where possible) action steps for project implementation and estimated costs.

The scope of the action plan will include:

- Enhancement of worship and faith community life
- Good stewardship of our ministry resources and properties
- Outreach to the wider community
- Faithful use of human resources members, volunteers, and paid staff.

This is a very active, vibrant and spiritual congregation. We hope you will continue to demonstrate that vitality by helping us. Please take advantage of the opportunities we are offering to share your thoughts, so that we can proceed into the future of our church together — with care, sensitivity, clarity and faith.

Thank You, CCB Planning Task Force, Les Slater (Chair) Jeanine Hanewicz, Sian Hunter, Larry Ruschmeyer, and Dan Smolnik Nancy Vodra (Moderator), Dave Goral (Vice Moderator), Bryn Smallwood-Garcia and Jennifer Whipple (Pastors) It's official. Congregational Church of Brookfield is a "teaching parish" once again. Like a "teaching hospital," we have given three young women now the opportunity to learn and grow into their calls to serve the Christian church as religious professionals.

First it was Alanna Copenhaver, in her Yale Divinity School "middler" year of 2012-13. Working with the YDS Department of Supervised Ministries, Alanna got course credit for two semesters of "field education," with me as her primary mentor and teacher. Our Moderator Nancy Vodra volunteered to chair our CCB "Teaching Parish Committee," which included several other lay people who met with our students regularly to give them feedback and an opportunity to learn from a wide range of church experiences.

Alanna's experience helped her enormously – so much so that she talked it up with her YDS friend Kendra Joyner, who was able to add to her parish experience (which had been primarily in youth ministry) with a 2013 summer internship with us, where her primary mentor and teacher was Pastor Jen.

And now, this past summer, our own church "daughter" Jane Moran, a member of the Confirmation Class of 2008, served as our 2014 Summer Intern. Now a rising Senior at the University of Connecticut, Storrs, Jane will be completing her B.A. in Classics and beginning further discernment about seminary and authorization for a future in ordained pastoral ministry.

I asked Jane to share with us her wonderful "three sentences" of farewell that she offered on her last Sunday preaching and leading worship with us, on August 17th:

Why do I love my church?

I love my church because no other place has been such a constant and caring source of support in my life. The church has given me worship on Sunday mornings, with all those beautiful hymns and sermons and prayers, and Bible study on Mondays. Going back further, it's given me Sunday School and Confirmation Class and a thousand other opportunities to learn more about my faith and myself. I give to my church because, in short, it feels right. This community has given so much to me—things tangible and intangible, things far too numerous to name here. I know that the scale will never be even, but I think it only fitting that I should give back what I can. My gifts, and my words, fall painfully short of expressing the depths of my gratitude, but I feel it would be ungrateful of me not to make an attempt.

In addition, Jane submitted the following thank-you note to CCB:

This summer has been a wonderful opportunity for me to learn more about ministry and the inner workings of the church. I can't tell you how much I've appreciated your willingness to have me sitting in on your meetings or stumbling over the call to worship in the pulpit on Sunday mornings. As much as I'm going to miss all of you when I'm back at college, I want all of you to know that I couldn't be prouder to have such a wonderful church family supporting me. I've enjoyed getting to know all of you this summer, and I'm looking forward to coming back and visiting CCB. Thank you so much for everything you've done for me.

Isn't it wonderful to know that our little local church is living up to our call from Jesus, in Matthew 28, to "go out and make disciples of all the nations"? Seminaries cannot do the job alone of preparing church leaders; it is truly the "work of the people" to plant the seeds that grow the next generation of pastors. If you have any doubt, you may enjoy these brief updates from our former students:

Since graduating in 2014, Alanna has served on the Chaplain team at Harvard Divinity School. I am attending Kendra's ordination October 3rd, at her home church in Salisbury, NC. She has been called as an Associate Pastor for Youth and Young Adult Ministries at Glen Ellyn Congregational Church in the suburbs of Chicago. Kendra was married August 2 to Dan Miller, who is studying to become a Lutheran pastor.

# Report from the Wecome Committee - Our New Greeter Ministry

# Make Jesus Your Mentor: Pray Share WELCOME

Our new Greeter ministry is now a year-long program. We hope you have enjoyed learning more about your fellow members – as well as being greeted!

In keeping with this church year's theme of Welcome, our own Welcome Committee decided to promote more opportunities for both long-time and recently joined members to reach out in our community and get to know one another better. Figuring that knowledge is power, the congregation now has more opportunities to get in touch with one another besides passing the peace to one's pew neighbor and to learn more about each other.

This opportunity also goes along with the request we heard about our Congregational Church of Brookfield's "welcome" vision priority and our United Church of Christ's credo of "extravagant welcome." Congregants have stated that welcome should be extended to all who enter our doors, whether someone enters for the first time ever or the first time that day.

We began our new Greeter ministry at the end of June, and it has been a great success. We station Greeters outside the front entrance of our worship space at 8:15 or 10:15am just to say "hello" to whomever arrives. (A member of the Welcome Committee still stands at the courtyard entrance.) If someone needs information ("Is Communion being served today?" "When and where is Church School?") then God provides – through the Greeters. After worship, Greeters attend coffee hour and are a familiar face to someone who might have passed by them. We include a short biography of that Sunday's greeters in the bulletin so that each week we all have an opportunity to learn about one another.

With the goal of having families, singles, and groups as greeters – and publishing their bios - we continue to recruit for both the 8:30 and 10:30 services. Greeting is a ONE-TIME ONLY duty. (You can, of course, volunteer to greet more than once.) Tom Young can send you the Greeter Bio form to fill out electronically. Contact him.

Or you can answer the questions found elsewhere in Crossways and place answers in the Welcome Committee's mailbox. Please give us the best phone numbers to reach you. (Phone numbers and e-mail addresses will not be published in the bulletin.)

Once Welcome has your bio completed, you will be asked what tentative ONE Sunday and service (8:30 or 10:30) fits your schedule. It would be a blessing to receive as many bios ASAP - even if you know you can't be a greeter until sometime after Groundhog's Day. We can schedule around choir, usher, and perhaps even ministerial duties.



# Visit Our Library Corner

(in the Church Library between Brooks Hall and the upstairs kitchen) The Insanity of God by Nik Ripken. The author writes under a pseudonym to protect the people whose stories unfold in the book. It is a true story of a missionary family who served in Somaliland in 1992 after the area went through a civil war to win independence from Somali.

The area at that time reminded the author of an Old Testament world that did not know Jesus and never heard his message. There was so much destruction and hate that he wondered what he was do-

ing there and how he could make a difference. "How can someone live the abundant victorious life that Jesus promised in the world's hardest places?" Ripken started traveling to places where he knew Christians were persecuted for their belief in Jesus the Christ. It is not something most of us in the U.S. have experienced. Certainly not here in Brookfield, CT. We are very lucky to be able to go to church whenever and wherever we want or buy a Bible, including several different versions, in any book store.

The stories Ripken collects from Russia, Ukraine, China, India, Middle East, and other countries, are incredible. The stories have stayed with me; not something I will forget. The stories have stayed with me; not something I will forget. Jesus said, "If they persecuted me, they will persecute you also" (Luke 15:20). "Go and make disciples of all nations" (Matthew 28:19).

We are free to witness to others about Jesus more than persecuted Christians around the world. So, who have you witnessed to recently?

## Connecticut Conference Minister Preaches at CCB Sept. 14

Save the date and plan to worship with us on September 14<sup>th</sup> as we welcome back to our midst our former Associate Pastor, Kent Siladi, who got his start in ministry at Congregational Church of Brookfield back in the 1980s.

Our own Rev. Jennifer Whipple was on the CT Conference (United Church of Christ—UCC) Search Committee that called the Rev. Siladi back to Connecticut. He began his duties as Conference Minister in June of 2013. Prior to that time he was the Conference Minister of the UCC in Florida for six years. He was on the Conference staff of this Conference for 10 years, serving as a Regional Minister. He also was a local church pastor for sixteen years serving two churches in the Connecticut Conference (Brookfield and North Guilford).

Rev. Siladi, a graduate of Nasson College and Yale Divinity School, has been involved in all of the settings of the United Church of Christ. He has served as a local church pastor, in the Association setting as a member of a Committee on Ministry, in the Conference setting as staff and in the national setting as a participant in the UCC History, Theology and Polity Network. He chaired the General Synod 25 Nominating Committee and was the host Conference Minister for Tampa's General Synod 28. He serves now on the Board of Directors of the Cornerstone Fund and is the Chairperson of the Council of Conference Ministers. He is one of the writers of the UCC "Affirming Faith" Confirmation curriculum and has written for various faith-based periodicals.

As Conference Minister his responsibilities include offering a ministry of leadership and relationship, communicating the mission and ministry of the Connecticut Conference, providing programmatic and Conference staff oversight, assuring business and financial oversight and representing the Connecticut Conference to the wider church.

The September 14th sermon, "Please Don't Let this be our Church!" is based on Revelation 3:14-22. Rev. Siladi will also be available for conversation with you at 9:30am and 11:30am in Fellowship Hall. Bring your questions!.
