Meeting of Church Council: April 14, 2015

In an effort to keep the congregation better informed as to the actions taken or being considered by the Church Council, we include a summary of significant actions in the monthly Crossways.

Moderator: Nancy V. opened the meeting with prayer and thanked all outgoing and continuing Council members. Larry R. moved to accept the call to the annual meeting as written in the agenda. Seconded by Jeanine H. The motion passed.

Vice Moderator: Dave G. reported that the 2015-16 budget will show an \$8K (rounded) surplus carryover. The year ended with 99% of budgeted income received, but only 98% of budgeted expenses were spent. Pledge income rose from 92% of pledge budget in March to 97% at year-end.

Council nominated 7 members to be asked to serve on the new Long-Range Planning Committee.

Christian Growth and Enrichment: Mike A. moved approval of \$650 for camper scholarships for Silver Lake this summer. Bryn seconded. The motion was approved. The \$700 that was approved last month for Megan Montgomery's mission trip to the Dominican Republic has not been distributed. Megan is not able to make the trip at this time, but may try again at a later date.

In Jennifer's absence, Bryn made a motion to allow SYF to conduct a tag sale at the Barn as a fundraiser for their summer mission trip to Long Beach, NY. The sale will be June 6, the same day as the CIS Thrift Shop. Gordon M seconded. Jeanine H. raised concerns about poor air quality in the barn caused by animal droppings and possible mold. The motion was amended as follows: The sale will be allowed as long as we 1) disclose to all volunteers the air quality issues, and 2) have Church House inspect the Barn's floor to ensure there are no structural safety issues. The motion passed as amended.

Nancy suggested that Council review Fundraising Guidelines adopted in 2006 and prepare to discuss them at the May Council meeting.

Jeanine H. moved to accept the minutes of the March Council meeting with corrections. Jean D. seconded. The motion passed. Jeanine asked for a correction to January 2015 Council minutes to record the December 14, 2014 email vote which approved the Lindroths' 3-month stay in the Cottage. Nancy reported that Facilities Use Committee agreed to the Lindroths' request for a 3-month extension at the Cottage (through June 30) with the understanding that deadline would be final.

Treasurer: Sung G. noted that \$24K in income came in during the last week of the fiscal year. Some was pledge money and some was Facilities Use income. Fair income of \$753, held in the Church Council account, will be paid to Dan McKee when we get his bill for Yankee Fair t-shirts.

Worship: Easter Sunday attendance at the 10:30 service was 324 adults, standing room only. Sunrise Service at Happy Landings worked out well, with 58 people attending. Attendance at 8:30am on Easter was not reported. Lenten Suppers were not well attended, so Lenten Lunches may return next year.

CIS: Asked permission to allow "early bird" opening of the Thrift Shop on Friday evening June 5th, from 6 to 8pm. Gordon M. moved to allow the proposal. Bob B. seconded. The motion was approved.

CE: Planning a June 14 Sunday School Teacher Recognition Day and Church School Picnic.

Pastor's Report: Bryn reported a visitor gathering set for May 3 at 9:30am, with new members probably welcomed on May 17th. Planning Task Force informational meetings will be held on May 24 at 9:30 am and June 7 at 9:30 and 11:30 am. Bryn will be attending General Synod, and an informational meeting for anyone else interested in attending will be held at 9:30am on June 14. Gordon M. will be joining the Pastoral Relations Committee. Prayers requested for Martha Parvis, whose father died April 13.

Notes from the Choir Room — Toni Sullivan, Director of Music

Live Your Faith through Stewardship: Did you know?

What would you guess if you had to answer the question, "Who (or *what*?) is the largest pledger to our church's operating budget?"

First of all, all our pledge information is kept confidential by our Stewardship Committee and Office Manager, who do all the counting and recording of our weekly giving to the offering plate, or online donations. But did you know we have quite a few other sources of income from which we can draw to "keep the lights on for you"?

Perhaps the "*What* is the largest pledger?" is the clue you need. The answer is that this year \$45,239 was donated to our operating budget from our CCB endowment fund. And that is an increase of more than \$4,000 from last year!

Our church benefits each and every year from a giving formula adopted years ago by our Investment Advisors, who manage our endowment funds. According to this formula, which is known as the "Total Spending Rule," 4 percent of the entire value of the general endowment funds at the end of each calendar year (December 31) is the contribution which is made to the operating budget of the church. Another 1.5 percent of that value, \$16,965 this year, is donated each year to the Building and Grounds Fund – which enables our Church House Committee (with a vote of the congregation) to pay for major repairs or enhancements to our property.

And exactly how did we get an endowment in the first place? The simple answer is that a number of people, just like us, loved the church and wanted to see the work of the church continue. Some people have left money to the church in a will or other bequest. Our former housekeeper put aside part of her very minimal salary from the church and instructed her family to give it to the endowment fund when she died. By the time Gena Smalley did pass away, the amount in that one bank account had grown to \$15,000! Another family (NOT church members) gave a large donation in gratitude for a Memorial Service and the pastoral care the church provided at their time of need. That donation went directly into the Building and Grounds Fund at their request.

Three anonymous donations were received this year from living donors for a total of \$120,000. Of that amount, \$10,000 was donated into the Mission Endowment Fund. The income from that Fund is given to the Church-in-Society Committee to be used to help others, near and far. Another \$10,000 went into the Building and Grounds Fund to help maintain our church campus. The largest portion went in the General Endowment. With this increase, the Investment Advisors were able to increase their donation to our 2015-16 operating budget by approximately \$4,000.

There are two other Endowed Funds which this year did not happen to receive any contributions, but they have in the past. One is the Youth Fund, which is available to help fund special events for our youth, such as a contribution last year to help with the expenses of the youth mission trip to South Dakota. The other is the Music Endowment Fund, which was established to help enrich the music program of our church.

Who can give to the endowment? Anyone! Some donations are large, but other gifts to endowment have been as small as \$25.

Regardless of size, your gift speaks of your love of our church. Whether you remember the church in your will or estate plan, donate in gratitude for a special event such as a birthday or wedding anniversary, or simply find that you have some extra money to share that will help you with a tax deduction, know that your gifts are always gratefully received by our whole congregation. For it is only with a vote of the congregation that disbursements from these special funds are made. By endowing the church for the future, even long after you are gone, you can ensure that our congregation can continue to share God's love for generations to come.

We are past Easter. We made it through Lent, which traditionally is a time of tension and apprehension, as we contemplate the series of events that led to the most glorious celebration in the Christian calendar. Personally, I think we have it

backwards, seemingly making a bigger deal out of Christmas, but that is a topic for a future post.

One thing associated with Lent is giving up something. This year, upon the advice of an article written by a Jesuit priest, I tried something different. He argued that instead of giving something up, why not resolve to just be "nice." To everyone. All the time.

So I tried. It wasn't always easy, but the world became a tiny bit better during Lent.

Spotlight: The Worship Committee

The Worship Committee has the honor and the pleasure of working very closely with both Reverend Bryn Smallwood-Garcia and Reverend Jennifer Whipple in making sure that our worship services run smoothly and efficiently. We work "behind the scenes" and sometimes "in the scenes" to

make sure everything during our worship services goes according to plan. The Flower Committee and the Music Committee are both sub-committees of the Worship Committee. Two important areas that we assist with are the coordination and scheduling of lay readers and the coordination, training and scheduling of ushers. A large part of what we do encompasses planning and implementation of plans for Advent and Lent. This includes setting up for the Maundy Thursday service, assisting with Easter Sunrise service details, and preparing the worship space for holiday services.

The Media Booth is also the responsibility of the Worship Committee. Currently, the Media Booth is staffed by youth in our congregation under the direction of John Smallwood-Garcia. The Media Booth is an important part of our ministry as it increases our outreach into the community by providing cable television access of our worship services to our homebound members. We also have the capability to record special events such as weddings and memorial services. The Music Committee is a sub -committee of Worship, and we are blessed to have our Music Director, Toni Sullivan, serving as chairperson. Toni reports on all musical aspects of our services and special musical events in which our talented musicians participate. The Flower Committee, another sub-committee, was until just recently chaired by Barbara Sikorski. There are several members of the Flower Committee who are in charge of the flowers for a particular month. Barbara for many years has been the coordinator of flowers and visual displays for holidays, such as Thanksgiving, Christmas/Advent, Palm Sunday and Easter. Since Barbara has stepped down as chairperson, we are grateful that Kathy Wandelmaier and Tina Crepeau have stepped up to the job. Many thanks, Barbara and Kathy & Tina!

We enjoy being part of a committee that strives to make our church and worship services meaningful and welcoming for all members and visitors. Thank you to our congregation for your patience when we try something new or different. 

Pastor's Page

Rev. Jennifer Whipple

At our recent Annual Meeting we had a chance to reflect a bit on the church year that has just passed and to look forward a bit to the opportunities and ministries that are awaiting us as we enter into a new program year together. Bryn mentioned in a recent sermon that we are a busy church full of busy people—people who are busy both within the walls of the church and outside of the church with work lives, school lives, family lives, community programs, public service, sports, etc etc etc. It gets exhausting just mentioning all of those things....and knowing that they are just the tip of the iceberg in some respects. We are a church full of do-ers. Yet, as we enter into this new program year and focus once again on our shared vision, we are invited to take a moment or two to remember where the strength, where the support, where the talents and gifts that we are so generous in offering come from. We are invited to take a moment or two (perhaps each day even) to connect or re-connect to the source, to sit with God and to just be. To be "human be-ings instead of human do-ings," as the now popular term has been coined.

In order to assist with these few moments, I wanted to share some excerpts from one of my favorite meditations with you. It is from the book *Spiritual Direction: Wisdom for the Long Walk of Faith* by Henri Nouwen. The idea is to take a little bit of time as you read through the following words—to breathe and not just rush on through but to let the words really sink in. It is amazing what a few moments of just breathing can do to reset us and offer renewal. So here you go—a little gift from me to you...

A Meditation on Psalm 46:10

Be still. Be quiet...Be silent...Be tranquil. Be present...Be now....Be here... The first task of the disciple is to be with the Lord....to sit at His feet, to listen and to be attentive to all He says, does, and asks.

Be still...It is hard. It means to let God speak to us...breathe in us...act in us...pray in us... To be still is to trust...to surrender...to let go...to have faith.

Be still...God is and God acts...not once in a while...not on special occasions...but all the time...Be still and listen to the one who speaks to you always, feel the actions of the one who acts always...and taste the presence of the one who is present always.

Be still and know that I am God.

*Be still and know that I love you...*that I hold you in the palm of my hand...that I have counted the hairs of your head...that you are the apple of my eye...that your name is written in my heart... "Do not be afraid...it is I."

Be still and know that I am God. God is not in the storm, nor in the earthquake, nor in the fire, but in the still, small voice, the gentle breeze, and the sheer silence...

Be still and know that I am God. Take these words with you in the week to come...let them be like a little seed planted in the good soil of your heart and let it grow...

Be still and know that I am God.

O Lord, I know now that it is in silence, in a quiet moment, in a forgotten corner of my heart that you will meet me, call me by name, and speak a word of peace. Let me be still and know you by name. Amen.

Board of Deacons
