Church Council Meeting of May 12, 2015

In an effort to keep the congregation better informed as to the actions taken or being considered by the Church Council, we include a summary of significant actions in the monthly Crossways.

Donations: Pastor Whipple made a motion to accept a donation of a small, upright piano from the Wandelmaier family and an anonymous cash donation for purchasing a new piano for the Meetinghouse. Gordon M. seconded. The motion passed unanimously.

Moderator's Report: Dave G. asked Council members to review the role of a Council Representative. **Planning Task Force:** Five people (Michael Matson, Maurice Downey, Cindy Field, Deseré Edwards, & Larry Ruschmeyer) have agreed to serve on the Long Range Planning Committee, and two more are considering it.

Yale Divinity School (YDS) Intern: Jennifer moved to accept Carolyn Rolleston as our intern for the 2015-16 school year. Jeanine H seconded. The motion was amended to cover any possible overage on the \$1,000 budgeted for her mileage expenses. The motion passed unanimously. Nancy Vodra will lead the Teaching Parish Committee, which will support Carolyn and her YDS mentor, Pastor Bryn.

Approval of Minutes: A correction to the Pastors' Report in the April 2015 Council meeting minutes will read "Bryn will be attending General Synod as a representative of the Fairfield East Association" (not CCB). Larry R. moved to approve the minutes with corrections. Bob B. seconded. The motion passed unanimously. There were no corrections to the minutes of the 2014-15 Annual Meeting. The vote for approval of these minutes will be taken at the 2015-16 Annual Meeting.

Treasurer's Report: Cash flow was positive in April. P&L and Balance Sheet are both in good order.

Committee Reports

Fellowship: Forty-two people attended Serendippers May 12. Linda Siciliano spoke about SERRV, and some \$300 worth of goods were sold. BHS Special Chorus was to perform at CCB May 18.

Worship: Endorsed the choice of Carolyn Rolleston as our new YDS intern. Outdoor worship at 8:30 starts on June 7. Campfires will be held on the 5 Wednesdays in July, and are sponsored now by CE.

Nominating: The committee still has to fill two openings on the Christian Education Committee.

Deacons: The Deacons met May 6 with Confirmands, who will join the church May 31. A new Stephen Ministry training class will be offered in September, in partnership with St. Paul's Episcopal Church.

Christian Education: Youth Sunday and the All-Church Picnic are coming up on June 14.

Stewardship: Annual statements were sent out, and a timetable for 2015-16 events is being set up.

Church in Society: The Thrift Shop will be open on Friday evening, June 5, from 5:00 to 8:00 pm. The first donation Saturday went very well. CIS's theme for this year is still under discussion.

Church House: Ken Arifian will continue as chairman of Church House. Al Lindroth will take John Mangold's place as the CH representative on Facilities Use Committee. Steve Waschak will serve as Treasurer, and Walt Ostrom will serve as Scribe. The parking lot was recently re-striped.

Pastor's Report: Five new members were to be welcomed to the congregation on May 17 — a day set aside as Welcome Committee's "Name Tag Sunday" and a celebration of the 10th anniversary of the adoption of the Open & Affirming statement. A Baccalaureate service will be held on June 7. The Healthy Choices retreat was held at the Parsonage, and Jennifer said "thank you" for the opportunity to use that space. Church House did a safety walk-through of the Barn in preparation for the SYF tag sale, and nothing unsafe was discovered. The Men's Mission golf outing raised enough money to pay outstanding South Dakota men's mission trip bills.

Church Office: Summer office hours start June 22. CCB will be open Tuesdays through Thursdays from 9:00 am to 12:00 pm and closed on Monday and Friday.

Notes from the Choir Room

Look for some changes in the music program next year. We are reconfiguring our children's choir program with new ages and times.

Rehearsals are on Wednesdays for the following choirs:

4:00 - 4:30pm - Joyful Noise Choir - (Preschool Children ages 4 and 5, and Kindergarten)

4:30 - 5:00pm - Cherub Choir - (Children in grades 1-3)

Stephen Ministry Training Class – Small Seeds, Mighty Trees

Paul wrote, "I planted the seed, Apollos watered it, but God made it grow." ~ 1 Cor.3:6 Is it time to add more water to the seeds of faith that have been planted in you?

Stephen Ministry, our church's one-on-one confidential caring ministry, has been in operation in our church for 18 years. Stephen Ministers bring distinctively Christian care to those who are making that long journey through the valley of life's difficult times. They offer listening and spiritual comfort –bringing God's healing through faith and compassion.

Since our church became a Stephen Ministry congregation in the 1990s, this thriving program has been a blessing to individual care receivers, to the lay caregivers themselves, to the congregation, and to your pastors and deacons – who cannot, on their own, reach out to every soul in need of support.

We can become involved in this ministry in many ways. Some of us may recognize a call to caring ministry and apply to be a Stephen Leader or Stephen Minister. Others may accept the care of a Stephen Minister. Others offer regular prayers for our Stephen Ministers and their Care Receivers.

A new 50-hour training class to become a Stephen Minister will be starting in September. Classes will take place on Monday evenings and a few Saturday mornings (half day). They will run September through January with time off during the holidays. If you are hearing God's call and would like be considered for this ministry please speak to a Pastor or one of our Stephen Leaders for further information and an application.

Weather and other situations* permitting, fifteen minutes prior to the worship, Greeters station themselves to say hello to people who enter at the front of the church (a prime entrance for first time visitors.) ** After worship concludes, they occasionally stand with the pastor at that exit. If possible, Greeters also attend coffee hour that day.

- * Congregants with other duties can have their "Greeter Day" scheduled around choir, church school, ushering, etc.
- ** All members and consistent church-goers have the opportunity to be Greeters. If someone is unable to stand at the entrance for any reason, we can work around that. Of greater importance is the way our connectedness with one another grows as we learn more from each greeter's mini-biography.

What is SERRV you may ask?



SERRV is a nonprofit, fair trade organization representing 70 groups of artisans' and farmers' handcrafted items from 36 countries around the world.

The Congregational Church of Brookfield has a long history sponsoring SERRV. It began in the 1970s by Nancy Desmond with the backing of Fred and Edith Weighart in Brooks Hall on a hymnal bookshelf! Today our church sponsors SERRV as an outreach mission, and it has been expanded to include items from Beads For Life from Uganda, Sak Saum from Cambodia, Aid through Trade from Nepal and Simply Smiles Coffee from Mexico.

SERRV (an acronym for Sales Exchange for Refugee Rehabilitation and Vocation) was originally founded 65 years ago in Germany by the Church of Brethren. SERRV was an original founder of the World Fair Trade Organization and Fair Trade Federation!!

It has evolved into a large organization with an on-line store and mail out catalogs and also is sold under the auspices of Catholic Charities and the United Methodist Church. To celebrate their 65th year, SERRV has a new logo with a motto of "creating connections." Its' goal continues to be: eradicate poverty, pay fair wages for high-end hand crafts and offer training for product development and education to their participating cooperatives.

We at CCB strongly support SERRV with our after church sales and our yearly community outreach through the Yankee Fair booth and Alternative Gift Fair. SERRV also donates gift baskets for our CCB fundraising events. In the past five years alone, CCB has raised over \$48,000.00 for this outreach mission. Congratulations!

Each purchase has the unique ability to give twice: to the recipient and also to the artisans, farmers and their families. We encourage you to further explore SERRV online at serrv.org where you can look at their catalogs, read about the artisans, coop groups and educational missions.

Got Cleveland? I'm going on my very first trip to Cleveland at the end of June, and I'm thrilled. And it's not because Cleveland is the home of the Rock 'n' Roll Hall of Fame. It's because I get to go to a 6-day long church meeting with about 3,000 friends in faith — fellow members of the United Church of Christ (UCC) from all across the United States!

Cleveland is the site of the national headquarters of our church's denomination, the UCC, and where our 30th Biannual General Synod will be held. I am a delegate from the Fairfield East Association delegate of the Connecticut Conference of the UCC, so I'm loading up the family van and heading west on Thursday, June 25th, to begin that afternoon a meeting that is likely to adjourn near midnight on Tuesday, June 30th.

Every year or two since the United Church of Christ was formed, in Cleveland, Ohio, on June 25, 1957, delegates from the various local associations and (now 38) regional conferences of our churches have convened for this national meeting — for worship, study, and discernment on the positions we want our elected leaders to take on various issues and the directions we want them to steer our national denomination in the two years to come.

My first General Synod was the 8th one, in 1971, when my father, the lay moderator of the Southern Conference (which covers North Carolina and tidewater Virginia), packed me into the back of our old Chevy station wagon to drive us to Grand Rapids, Michigan. And as a newly confirmed youth of the UCC, in such a era of social change and progressive optimism, it was truly life-changing. I couldn't wait to get to my next one!

Our Northern California Conference of the UCC hosted the 20th General Synod in 1995 in Oakland, when I was pregnant with my daughter Lela. My son Jacob (then 2) worked with me in the kid's program — which I was leading as one of the host church volunteers.

In 2005, I had the honor of getting to dust off my old press credentials to work with my father for *United Church News* in covering the 25th General Synod in Atlanta. That was a particularly thrilling meeting as we became the first Christian denomination to endorse gay marriage, as we voted to urge local churches to advocate for "equal marriage rights for all."

It all came full circle in 2007, as I arrived here in Brookfield in time to attend the 26th General Synod in Hartford with my teenage children — and take part in the celebration of our 50th anniversary as a national denomination. We got to hear then-Senator Barak Obama speak of his conversion to Christianity late in life as a member of Trinity UCC in Chicago, but we also heard Lynn Redgrave (who died in 2010) talk of her long struggle with cancer and how our UCC pastor in Kent reached out to her in the hospital and brought her, for the first time, to a life of faith. Bill Moyers, who grew up Baptist, spoke of his love of his new UCC church — which he discovered near his home on Long Island.

Finally, in June 2013, I went to General Synod 29 in Long Beach, CA — for the first time as a voting delegate. One of the great benefits was getting to know so many wise and gifted members of our Connecticut delegation, but also to reconnect with so many of my former seminary interns — now serving UCC churches across the country.

If you have questions, or want to learn more about this year's 30th General Synod in Cleveland, I invite you to attend an "in between" in Fellowship Hall at 9:30am on Sunday, June 14th. I'm delighted that my father will be here with us that day to share his stories too.

Board of Deacons

Your Deacon Branch provides a way for you to have a specific member of the Board with whom to relate. If you have requests or concerns that you'd like to share with a lay person, your Deacon is available. Naturally, if you're more comfortable calling one of the other deacons, or one of your pastors, please feel free to do so. Such requests or concerns might include:

- a need for prayer
- a request for help (transport to a doctor's appointment, church function, etc.)
- a sorrow (illness, accident, death)
- a joy (a birth, graduation, upcoming wedding, etc.)
- something that particularly pleases you, or would better meet your needs in the worship service

Remember, if you don't know your Deacon, ask someone to introduce you. He or she will look forward to meeting you – in church or out!
