Meetings of Church Council for September 8, 2015

In an effort to keep the congregation informed this is a brief summary of items discussed during the monthly Church Council Meeting.

Long Range Planning Committee (LRPC): Maurice Downey gave an update. The committee is at the end of the transition from the Planning Task Force. They have identified three criteria for determining whether or not a project should be reviewed by the LRPC: 1. The project is not covered by any standing committee. 2. The project cost far exceeds the budget of a committee that would be responsible for it. 3. The project generates recurring maintenance costs.; Repairs to the barn are underway. Interior structural work is complete, and cupola work is in progress. Roof repair will be done last.; Council agreed to provide time for LRPC to present findings and hear ideas at the next Program Board — at a date to be determined – with the LRPC as the sole agenda item.

Council approved Bryn's and Jennifer's ministerial goals for the coming year. In keeping with Bryn's goal of increasing CCB's public visibility, there will be a "Blessing of the Animals" on October 4. Committee reps were reminded that budgets for FY 2016 -17 are due to Vice Moderator Robin Murphy by November 10th.

Investment Treasurer's Report, Second Quarter 2015: \$39,946.60 was transferred from General Endowment to operating budget. \$16,964.59 was transferred from General Endowment to Buildings & Grounds Fund. Market value of Endowment Funds increased \$3,583.41 in the second quarter.

Treasurer's Report: P&L: Only 88% of budgeted income was received this month, but income is ahead of budget for the year because of one large pledge last month. Endowment income was less than expected due to an overall downturn in the market. Expenses were only 84% of budget this month, 94% for the year. Balance Sheet: September is a big expense month, Money may be tighter for the rest of the fiscal year.

Committee Reports

Worship: Two ushers are still needed. Bob Brown is recruiting.

Deacons: The Deacons approved Carolyn Rolleston as an officiant for serving communion, but Carolyn has decided to terminate her CCB internship in order to pursue her interest in hospital chaplaincy. **Christian Education:** The committee thanks everyone who added an apple to the "Fruits of the Spirit" bulletin board. Kids in grades K-6 will begin a 2-year curriculum on Faith Practices. Jennifer is working on assigning Confirmation mentors. Senior Youth Fellowship's Mission Trip Sunday is September 20. Fellowship: Serendippers were entertained by magic tricks performed by Rev. "Des" Desmond. Nominating: Council approved Monica McInerney to replace Dan Smolnik as an Investment Advisor. Church in Society: Becky Bishop will offer a nutritional counseling program with the youth fellowship groups as part of CIS's theme "Body, Mind, and Spirit." Also coming soon, Adult Coloring with milk and cookies! The Women's Mission Trip will be to the Providence Rescue Mission. See Monica McInerney if you would like to go.

Pastors' Reports

Bryn: People have been visiting CCB during the summer and loving it. Please keep Bryn and Jennifer in your prayers as they counsel several members on serious issues. Fall sermon series "Look at the World" will be advertised in the coming weeks. The Association of Religious Communities (ARC), of which CCB is a founding member, is seeking retired teachers and other volunteers to give two hours a week to a tutoring and mentoring program for kids in Danbury.

Jennifer: Thank you for days off so she could officiate at her cousin's wedding and for her 10th anniversary celebration. Next year is her sabbatical year, and she will be away from late July through mid-October.

Notes from the Choir Room

I will sing of the loving kindness of the LORD forever; To all generations I will make known Your faithfulness with my mouth. Psalm 89:1

I was listening to some parents talking the other day about all the activities in which their children are involved. This included soccer,

gymnastics, dance, piano lessons, etc. I realized how few of them included church choir in the list. That got me thinking about why choir has always been so important in my life.

That's why I decided to do a series for *CrossWays* this year entitled "Why Sing in the Choir?" Each month, I will write about a different aspect of what it means to be a part of a choir. So, why sing in the choir?

You are part of a group of caring people who enjoy singing together.

The caring part is important. We encourage new members in our church to get involved in a committee in order to meet people in the church. Committee members come and go. The choir is a long-standing group. Members often stay in the choir for years. Why? In some ways it begins to feel like a family. Choir members form friendships, are fed spiritually through the music, and they enjoy each other's company. We pray for each other and support each other in times of need. We miss each other over the summer and love that feeling of coming together again in the fall.

The children who sing in choirs also form long-standing friendships, not only with friends in their own grade, but with others in the choir too. They learn to help each other and to work together to make a beautiful sound. Through discussions and songs, they learn that caring for others is important in life. They also learn about God's love and care for them. Intergenerational connections are made when the pastors join with all the participating choirs in prayer before the church services.

What's Happening in Church School?

This summer our church school children had an opportunity to work on "Big Hearts Farm" where they learned about the fruit of the Spirit and how to identify, grow, and share those fruits with others. As they did so, a tree "grew" in our church school wing, and our adults had a chance to get in on the fun as they wrote about the many ways they share their "fruits" and faith out in their everyday lives. We invite you to spend a little time in the church school wing taking a look at the "Got Fruit?" bulletin board and our new tree.

Also over the summer we convened a small group of parents, church school teachers, and other interested church members to discuss the goals of church school and possible curriculum ideas. This small group looked through curriculum options and identified a United Church of Christ curriculum called "Faith Practices" to guide our church school through the next two years.



Children from Preschool through 6th grade will use this new curriculum. Faith Practices is a comprehensive education, worship, and activity resource that is structured to help transform one's life and become a person of faith. Our children will embark on a journey to explore the following 12 Faith Practices: *Giving and Receiving Hospitality*, *Living Stewardship, Keeping Sabbath, Playing and Living Joyfully, Encountering Scripture, Giving Testimony and Witness, Praying and Making Ritual, Working For Justice, Honoring The Body, Blessing and Letting Go, Experiencing Beauty and Discovering Gifts of Ministry*. This is a Bible based curriculum, the goal of which is to help direct our church school children to a closer, deeper experiential relationship with God and the people of God.

Our 7th and 8th graders will be preparing for the next step in their faith journeys through a new discussion and service-based church school opportunity called "Bibles and Bagels." They will meet on the 2nd & 4th Sundays of the month to participate in activities and discussion pertaining to subjects that are important in their lives (i.e. stress, friendship, peer pressure, competition, etc.) from a faith-based perspective, as well as participating in active discipleship through service projects.

"Bold and Brazen" -- a study of the Hebrew Prophets -- begins Oct. 4 Sunday Night Adult Study meets 5-6:30pm in the Church Library

Devoted followers of this collection will recognize Essex's straightforward style of Bible study, and new readers will appreciate the modern-day relevance of her writing and well-organized study and reflection questions at the end of each chapter.

Lives of the Saints: Richard Brian Stewart

Richard was born in Pontiac, MI on April 2, 1952. He was the youngest of three children. Always a "tell me why" kind of kid, he was bound to seek higher learning. After his father lost his job in Michigan due to down-sizing, they moved from an urban area outside of Detroit, to a most decidedly NON-urban area in Williamsburg, KY, when he was 15-years-old. After high school graduation, he applied – but was not immediately accepted - to the University of Kentucky pharmacy school. So he attended Cumberland College, a more affordable alternative. His grades eventually won admittance to UK. He graduated in 1975, taking the pharmacy boards a week before his wedding to Jamie Abell, his college sweetheart. His careers led him from hospital pharmacist, to UK Field Professor, to pharmaceutical sales for Upjohn, Pharmacia and Pfizer. His later, most enjoyable years were spent in management training, experience he shared with the leadership and congregation of CCB!

His 2003 promotion with Pfizer brought him to the New York area from outside Cincinnati, OH. Sticker shock took them house hunting to Brookfield. Thank God. LITERALLY! They came to the "little white church on the hill," knowing nothing about the Congregational Church, but instantly feeling the warmth and welcome from its members!

Raised Baptist and an avowed Bible nerd, Richard attended a year of seminary in 1977, only to decide that his service would be in lay work. He enjoyed occasional lay preaching and loved leading Bible studies with the Men's Fellowship of CCB, a group that he held close to his heart, spiritually and emotionally! He was devoted to the men's group, formed deep bonds, and loved to spend time preparing for Saturdays!

Richard was diagnosed with Stage 4 renal cell carcinoma on August 19, 2011. With his medical background, he sought to know everything he could about his form of cancer and do everything in his power to beat it. But God called home one of his most devoted followers on August 12, 2012.

Jamie wrote, "Our church family was right there with us during the fight and his return home, providing support, prayers, cards, meals and daily hugs. God richly blessed us by placing us with this church family during an incredibly tough time. We both felt that it was a God thing." He loved his family. Wife Jamie now lives in Mason, a Cincinnatti northern suburb. She was deeply treasured by Richard, who often spoke of their mutual love and respect. He would turn to her for wisdom as she was his confidante and safe harbor. Daughter Laura, 35, lives in Ohio with hubby Jeff and grandson Timothy, who loved his PopPop. Granddaughter Hailey was born 2 years after Richard's passing. Son Ben is a general manager of a LensCrafters store in Kingston, NY. Youngest son Alex lives in Brooklyn and is engaged to be married to Samantha Kumar. Next summer, they will cut their wedding cake with the same knife used by Richard and Jamie at their wedding in 1975. He would have loved that.

Richard also loved sharing tales about his family and their Appalachian background. He was a natural storyteller, whose eyes would crinkle when he smiled. He was a man who would meet you where you were, no matter if it differed from his path.

Rest in peace, Brother Richard...sweet husband, devoted father, loving friend, man of integrity.

News from Former Yale Divinity School Intern, Carolyn Rolleston

After much thought, conversation, and discernment, I came to the very difficult conclusion not to continue with my internship at CCB. I determined that it would be better for me to be clear and upfront than it would be for me to continue on without being able to be fully present and engaged at the church. The central purpose of an internship through Yale Divinity School is to aid in the discernment process, and this process was helpful in that regard. I've felt called towards chaplaincy for a while. In being at Brookfield for a few weeks and looking at the year ahead, I very much missed the experience I had working as a hospital chaplain and felt the calling to pursue work more similar to that.

Please know that it's nothing about Brookfield, the staff, or the congregation that led me to this decision. Everyone was extremely kind and welcoming. In fact, the kindness of the community made this decision even harder. Bryn and Jennifer are incredible pastors, and I know that I would learn a lot from them. I do not, however, feel that God is calling me to parish ministry at this point in my life.
