Church Council Notes: November 8, 2016

Long Range Planning Committee Report: Since the appeal to raise funds to complete the sewer line connection was so successful, the projects that were approved in April can proceed as planned. Contractors are ready to start work on the connection on Nov. 14. LRPC will advise Council if construction will affect any church activities.

Refugee Resettlement: Ezat's first attempt at getting a Learner's Permit was unsuccessful, but once his English improves the test should be easier for him. He is using public transportation to get to his two temporary jobs. It is not realistic at this point for Kumar to get a job. Finding child care and transportation volunteers has been difficult.

Ministerial goals for Bryn and Jennifer were distributed to Council members (see page opposite.) Council approved the goals unanimously. There will be a Congregational meeting on January 8 to vote on a target budget for fiscal year 2017-2018.

Treasurer's Report: Income is \$5,000 under budget. All sources of income were below budget except for plate income, which was above budget. Expenses were \$15,000 below budget. Net income is \$10,000 above budget.

Committee Reports

Worship: Advent wreath making and Hanging of the Greens will be on Sunday evening, Nov. 27th. The Christmas pageant will be in 10:30am worship on Dec. 11. The Christmas Cantata will be in the 10:30am worship on Dec. 18. On Dec. 11 & 18, 8:30am Worship will be traditional Advent sermon and communion. There will be one 10:30am service on Sunday, Dec. 25 and Sunday, Jan.1.

Church House: The boiler in the cottage may need to be replaced in spring. The path connecting the parking lot and the Parsonage/Cottage is complete for now. Work will resume in spring. A handicapped-accessible door will be installed in Fellowship Hall. The organ swell box needs repair.

Deacons: Laura Westby's report on the Coordinator of Member Care position is being reviewed by Personnel Committee. Communion by intinction will be given at the single January 1 service.

Stewardship: Two PushPay tutorials were given. The next campaign starts on January 22 with pledge dedication on February 26. The theme will be *"What Would You Bring?"*

Welcome: Six new members were welcomed at the 10:30am service on Nov. 6, and 2 more were welcomed at the 8:30am service on Nov. 13. The committee would like to recruit more greeters.

Nominating: Council approved new Committee members: Linae Wutzl on Welcome Committee, Toni Sullivan on Nominating Committee.

Christian Education: The Great Pumpkin Challenge was well attended. Pageant planning is under way.

Church in Society: Lyn Lyon is the new CIS chairman. A collection box for the Association of Religious Communities (ARC) Winter Warm Things Drive has been placed in Brooks Hall. Tags for "One Warm Coat" will be on the Giving Tree. One Warm Coat collects coats for kids in Philadelphia. The collection is in memory of Melanie Shapiro's brother, Matthew MacKenzie, who was a teacher in Philadelphia.

Pastors' Reports: Jennifer thanks everyone for the time she was able to spend with her kids while on sabbatical. During that time she also took an on-line class that can be compared to an MBA for church leaders. Jennifer visited St. Lydia's Dinner Church in Brooklyn. She is considering the dinner church idea at CCB as an outreach program for young adults. Two new adult studies are about to start. The Monday morning group will read *Glorify* by Emily Heath. The Monday evening group will read *Convictions* by Marcus Borg.

Bryn said Laura Westby led the funeral service for Audrey Marshall while Laura was on call for her. Anyone who would like to pair up with a friend to light an Advent candle can contact Patty Moran. Danbury ARC is opening a Winter Warming Center at Central Christian Church, specifically for 2-parent families and teens. (The current "family" shelter is only for women & children under 12.) They are looking for 2 volunteers a night for 17 weeks.

My Blanket Story

November, 1950. Thanksgiving Day. My family arrived in New York City Harbor after an arduous journey across the Atlantic Ocean. We were a refugee family who had just fled Communist East Germany. My father was a wanted man for his involvement in anti-Communist propaganda. Our destination was Iowa, where a Presbyterian Church sponsored us. We knew no English. We carried only a few suitcases.

After disembarking, we boarded a train. Halfway through the journey the train encountered a blizzard. The train had to stop, and power was lost. Our family took out our blankets to wrap ourselves in some warmth. The porter walked through, checking all the passengers and stopped in front of my family. My father was taken away. Several hours passed before he returned after all of the train's blankets were accounted for. The porter thought our family had stolen the blankets from the sleeper cars, as they looked identical. But these blankets were given to us by Church World Service (CWS), from generous donors just like you!

Celebrating Christmas with Church in Society (CIS)



As with any request made at the Congregational Church of Brookfield, we hope you prayerfully consider which, if any, contribution you can make at this very busy time of the year!

We are continuing this year with collecting gifts under our Giving Tree. How does this work? We receive gift requests from both Brookfield Social Services

(approx. 5 families) and Interfaith AIDS Ministry (approx. 3 families). Under the guidelines of these agencies, adults are allowed one gift, children two gifts; gift costs are not to exceed \$30. CIS writes these requests on special shaped tags (one shape is for each family) and places these gift tags on the large Christmas tree in Brooks Hall. You and/or your family can choose a tag off the tree, purchase that gift and return it to the Giving Tree in Brooks Hall by Sunday, December 11th – in time for CIS to deliver the presents to these social service agencies.

Also on the Giving Tree will be tags for Baby Bundles, a ministry started to help new moms with items such as diapers and diaper wipes (items that cannot be purchased with food stamps). There will be tags for Holy Joe's Café (which supports U.S. troops); tags to support Providence Rescue Mission needs; tags requesting iTunes gift cards in support of Simply Smiles staff; AND requests for gift cards for gas/groceries/Target, etc, which are used at the discretion of the Pastors for those in need. We will also collect new hats, gloves, scarves for ARC.

Whew, what a Giving Tree with so many opportunities to share our blessings with those in need!

Next, we are pleased to announce that the red Salvation Army Kettle will again ring in the Christmas holiday in our Brooks Hall on Sunday, Dec. 11th. This mission is shared among all our Brookfield churches and has raised thousands of dollars over many years. Did you know that 90% of the proceeds stay right here in Brookfield? These funds go to the Brookfield Social Services and help pay for programs for which they don't have money in their budget. If you are able to participate, please know that we are grateful, and so are our neighbors in need.

Lastly, please look for the Alternative Gifts Fair, on Sunday, December 4th. This is an opportunity to purchase items, or make donations to worthy causes in lieu of buying traditional Christmas gifts.

CIS would like to wish you and yours a wonderful holiday season, and thank you for your outpouring of generosity to our neighbors in need.

Pastor's Page

With some trepidation, Pastor Jen and I chose our Advent theme this year as a call for us to examine the practice of public and communal ministry itself – as we take a look at the gifts that CCB has to give that is uniquely "ours." In other words, we might ask ourselves, "What gifts can a local church like ours offer the world that no other worthy nonprofit organization can offer?"

We hope our theme, "What Gift Will You Receive?", may help all of us find some interesting and inspiring answers as we each explore – we hope with renewed hope and wonder – our own deep emotional and spiritual needs, especially during this season of increasing darkness and cold.

One special seasonal gift that we on the Worship Committee identified right away is revealed in the way we have set up the lighting of the Advent candles each week. Instead of recruiting the usual nuclear "church families" to light the candles, we have invited pairs or groups of "church friends" to light candles together. This idea emerged as we got to thinking about what an enormous gift it can be to get to know people OUTSIDE our own families because of our involvement in worship, classes, groups, committees, mission trips, and other church activities.

On the First Sunday of Advent, this past November 27, our Advent Wreath Workshop and Worship was such a joyful event – over 80 crammed into Fellowship Hall to eat pizza and make wreaths together. We did tend to sit together as families, but the large tables meant families shared space and got to know one another better. And in a spirit of welcome, there was always room at the table for a newcomer or someone who came late or came alone.

My Sunday morning sermon, it turned out – "*The Gift of Light*" – was truly prophetic as one lone visitor showed up just because she saw our lights on in the Meetinghouse as we began the "hanging of the greens." She helped with both setup and take-down (like a truly seasoned Congregationalist) and her eyes gleamed with tears as she sang the familiar carols of the season and watched our eager children take turns lighting the Hope candle on each wreath. As she was leaving, she gave Pastor Jen's grandmother a hug and was profoundly disappointed that her new "church friend" was going home to Naugatuck and wasn't actually a local member with us!

The making and sustaining of healthy friendships is an important mission and ministry in thriving and vital churches like ours with many different kinds of opportunities to learn, serve, pray and share to-gether. We can learn so many life lessons from one another – many that get passed down from generation to generation – perhaps more in informal gatherings or in our day-to-day church work together than in formal educational settings.

Just think about it – "holy" communion is a broad sacrament among us Congregationalists. What laughs and mutual support happens during Morrison's Gang "coffee time," as they take a break on Tuesday mornings doing repairs around the church? Or think of the Serendippers Crew and the way they connect members old and new over a hot Tuesday lunch.

As you begin to explore with us *"What Gifts Will You Receive?"* we hope you may not only join us for worship and fellowship this Advent season, but perhaps invite a loved one or neighbor to join us as well. After all, this is the season of giving. This Christmas, don't limit yourself to trips to the mall and the kind of wrapped presents you can put under the tree. Give someone you care about one of these special Advent gifts only the Church of Jesus Christ can give.

Board of Deacons
