Church Council Summary for September 12, 2017

LRPC: Project leaders should turn in their project binders.

Moderator's Report: Fair funds will be divided as follows: \$1,000 to CCB Refugee Resettlement Ministry, 50% of the remaining funds to Silver Lake Conference Center for scholarships and 50% to IRIS. The motion was approved by email vote in August. Committee budgets are due in November, please submit to Mark Lyon. Jeannine McCullough's new title is Office Administrator. The deacons will update the Visiting Angels list. Visiting Angels assist with visitations, meals, and other assistance as needed.

Treasurer's Report: Overall income is \$14K ahead of plan. Expenses are \$2358 below plan. Tom B. will work on a quarterly year to year pledge income comparison.

Christian Growth & Enrichment Spending Request: Jennifer made a motion requesting CG&E funds to cover General Association fees (\$155) and registration fee (\$40) for workshop "Weird Church" that Jennifer and Toni S will attend on Oct. 25. Total spending request is \$195. Kristi M. seconded. The motion passed.

Committee Reports

Welcome: Visitor's gatherings will be held on Sept. 24 at 9:30 and Oct. 15 at 11:30.

Fellowship: The committee is in favor of the immigration education opportunity re: the UCC Immigrant Welcoming Church Resolution. They will host coffee hour on Sept. 24 when the church will celebrate its 260th anniversary.

Deacons: On Nov. 12 Tosha Gordon will be commissioned as a Stephen Ministry Leader. She will give the sermon that day. Jane Moran met with the Deacons after her Fairfield East Association meeting. The Deacons voted to continue to support Jane as a Member in Discernment through our church.

Church House: The lift has a leaking hydraulic cylinder. The repair bill will be significant. The cost was \$700 to diagnose the problem. It will take a couple of weeks for the parts to arrive. (Update: The lift has been fixed.)

Worship: The committee revised their budget in order to save money, and thanks all of the people who donated their musical gifts over the summer while Toni was away.

Church in Society: The Habitat for Humanity ReStore contacted the CCB Thrift Shop with a request for a promotional exchange. Jennifer made a motion to approve allowing CIS to put a link to the ReStore on the CCB web page in exchange for a link to the Thrift Shop on the ReStore web page. Kristi M. seconded. The motion passed. September's Thrift Shop proceeds of \$635 will go to the Red Cross for hurricane relief efforts.

Christian Education: On October 8 the Sunday School kids will be presented with a plaque recognizing the \$5,000 they raised for a Heifer Project Ark. The first confirmation class meeting will be held this month.

Nominating: Tom Y has created a Committee Field Guide to help committees recruit members and will be running this information in Sunday bulletins.

Pastor's Report: Bryn sends her thanks for her time off. There was good news from church members who were in Florida during the hurricanes. All were ok. Jennifer led the internment for Pauline Bankes and a funeral for Marie (Gertrude) Bartley.

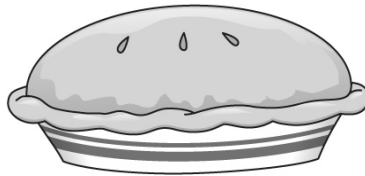

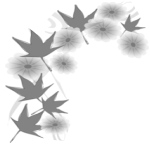
Silent Auction is creating gift baskets! If you have any items to include in a basket, or wrapping supplies, you can drop them off at the barn on Saturdays or in the church office.

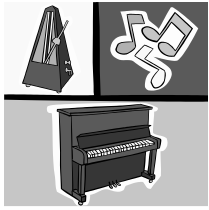

NOTES FROM THE CHOIR ROOM

This fall I am going to spotlight our children's choir program and tell you a bit about what our children are learning when they sing in choir.

This month will feature the Cherub Choir, which is for children in grades K - 2. Children at this age level are working on musical concepts, such as phrases, rhythms, words and melodic lines. They learn about basic note values and can clap various rhythms. We work on the concepts of high and low pitches, and they begin to recognize pitches on the musical staff and determine whether notes go up or down in the music. They learn how to sing with solfege syllables (do, mi, sol). The children begin to accompany themselves on the barred instruments, which are called Orff instruments.

The spirituality of our children grows as we talk about the meaning of the words of anthems. They find out how the church year works and how their anthems and songs fit into the church year. We pray at the end of each practice and connect with God and each other.

But most of all, we have FUN!

Stewardship 201: Why We Give

Welcome back to the classroom. During this lesson we will explore *Why We Give*. Every Sunday at worship service we hear from a different member of the congregation during our Call to Share with their heartfelt response to “Why I love my church” and “Why I give to my church” as we receive the morning offering. In their words we hear gratitude for grace received, and we share in the longing for peace and sense of home for all of God’s creation. Every person’s individual motivation for giving may be different as our church nourishes and touches each of our lives in various ways, but we may also find these common underlying themes:

- Approval of Leadership—Without the pastoral leadership and care ministries team, and the committee leadership throughout, the church would accomplish nothing. By accomplishing as much as we do, the congregation as a whole approves, even if there are parts with which some individuals may not agree.
- Belief in Church Mission—The programs and ministries that are congregationally approved seek to fulfill our Mission Statement: *As followers of Jesus Christ and a people gathered by the Holy Spirit, we covenant together with God and with each other to receive and share the Good News as we seek to live God’s word in our church and in the world.*
- Fiscal Responsibility—The transparency, thought and detail that go into our church’s fiscal life are commendable. It is part of the reason why our church is fiscally sound, while other churches are foundering. We may not all agree with every decision made on how we spend our money, but it is upon the overall picture and the level of trust built that one should base their giving, so that we as a church can remain fiscally sound and not only continue but expand our programs and outreach.

Consider what motivates you to give generously to the works and ministries of Christ’s church, and particularly what rewarding benefits you see at the Congregational Church of Brookfield. To God be the glory!

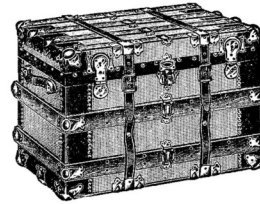
Lovers of antiques, collectibles, vintage, Americana, primitives, reproductions:

BUCKET CONTENTS AS SPECIFIED BY CHURCH WORLD SERVICE

- One five-gallon bucket with resealable lid (If bucket has been used, clean well but do not use if it has held chemicals of any kind.)
- Four scouring pads
- Seven sponges, including one large
- One scrub brush
- Eighteen reusable cleaning towels (e.g. Easy Wipes)
- One 50 oz. or two 25 oz. bottle(s) of liquid laundry detergent
- One 16-28 oz. bottle of liquid disinfectant dish soap
- One 12-16 oz. bottle of household cleaner that can be mixed with water (no spray bottles)
- One package of 48-50 clothespins
- Clothesline, two 50 ft. or one 100 ft.
- Five dust masks
- Two pairs non surgical latex gloves
- One pair work gloves, cotton with leather palm or all leather
- 24-28 heavy duty or contractor type 30-45 gallon trash bags on a roll and removed from carton
- One 6-9 oz. bottle of non-aerosol insect repellent

All cleaning items must be new – all liquid items must be capped and securely tightened. Place all items into the bucket, making sure they are packed securely to avoid damage during shipment. Snap the lid on tight and seal with packing tape.

As we move into October we will celebrate World Communion Sunday with some great music and different cultural elements in worship, remember our Baptisms as we baptize a little one into the life of our congregation, celebrate the purchase of that Gift Ark and other Heifer Project gifts, welcome people to our church grounds for the Yankee Fair, begin a new Parenting Support Series, and celebrate the saints that have gone before us on Book of Remembrance Sunday, which will also mark the 500th Anniversary of the Reformation – which made all of this possible as we join together in worship and fellowship together in our own unique way.
