Church Council Notes: November 12, 2019

Church Safety Committee: Kathy Taylor reviewed the Safety Committee's recommendations:

- 1. Improve communications: Station (6) Walkie-Talkies on chargers in Barbara Crandell's office. Sundays, one with Barbara, one with Miss Debbie, one with head usher, and one with rear usher (2 extras). Walter Ostrom is researching the cost, estimate about \$300.
- 2. Gain control of building access: Re-key all existing locks; document all new keys as they are distributed. Council to decide who gets a key (including outside groups). Estimate under \$1,000. Fellowship Hall Improvement Group (FHIG) is likely to include a new door locking system with a future capital campaign (like a key FOB system). It was suggested that if this re-key option is chosen, keys that can't be copied be purchased. Also asked was who would be in charge of handing out and maintaining the list of keys. (Would likely fall to Office Administrator, Jeannine McCullough.)
- 3. When announcements end at start of church service, ushers should lock all doors except courtyard entrance. Sign would be place by the front walk at the parking lot "If you find doors locked, please enter through the courtyard entrance, where a lift is available."

Beth asked why doorbell camera and sensor lights were not mentioned since many committees had recommended them. Kathy stated that these were not part of the Safety Committee's recommendation, but council can recommend them.

Motion (Bryn/Wendy): Council recommends that Church House investigate the purchase of a walkie-talkie system (up to a set of 6), as well as doorbell cameras and motion sensor lights. Passed unanimously. **Motion** (Bryn/Beth): Council requests Church House re-key all existing doors. After discussion, the motion was withdrawn, with the request that Council Reps ask their committees to re-discuss impact on their volunteers. **Motion** (Bryn/Sue): To adopt the policy for ushers to lock all but the courtyard doors following announcements, and place the sign described above by the parking lot. Passed unanimously, with the request for signage and congregational education before implementing, as well as installation of an emergency safety bolt high on the Church School side of the exterior door that our children from the courtyard entry hall. **Moderator**: Summary of FEA fall meeting – Sue W. reported that our CCB delegation attended the Fairfield East Association meeting in Redding and learned a lot about Silver Lake. **Vice-Moderator**: Sue W. shared Jack's written Vice Moderator's report on FHIG activities – FHIG has developed a draft milestone plan (which Council asked to see in December) that sug-

gests construction would start 2Q of 2021 the earliest. Council also asked for Crossways status update for January (Dec. 10 print deadline). FHIG is pursuing state grant monies, and have reviewed a third design option that the architects have provided, which recommends a bump-out option. FHIG is going to interview 2 to 3 organizations who do feasibility studies; this will then be turned over to a separate capital campaign team, with representation from multiple church committees. 2020-21 Budget update – Committee budgets are due to Jack Brown by Nov. 22nd.

Church Clerk: Approval of Minutes of the last CCB Church Council Meeting (October 8th, 2019) – 2 revisions were made. A motion was made by Wendy to approve the amended minutes of October 8th. The motion was seconded by Bryn and passed unanimously.

Church Treasurer: Financial Reports for October 2019 and Fiscal Year-to-Date – In Greg's absence, Sue briefly reviewed the summary report, and mentioned that there always seems to be a disparity between what Church Windows shows and what the Treasurer's report shows. Timing could be an issue – Sue will ask Greg when she sees him next.

Investment Treasurer: Update on Investment Activity – Audrey handed out her 3-month report ending 9/30/19. The quarter was down slightly and market value decreased with a slight unrealized loss of \$432, and designated funds had a small gain of \$2,302.

Stewardship Committee: Tom B. reported that Stewardship is holding off on celebrating legacy gifts until they are sure they have a complete list. They are developing a children's giving program with envelopes. The Passport Program will end with a party at 5pm on January 5, 2020.

Church Council Notes: November 12, 2019, continued

Fellowship – Michele O. reported on the success of presentations by Kerri Colombo and Tosha Gordon this fall; Becky Bishop will offer a nutrition program on Jan. 26, 2020.

CIS – Luke reported the Giving Tree will be put up Nov. 23rd; Thrift Shop had a good sale on Nov. 2nd, and \$2,763 was donated to IRIS from summer sales; SERRV had a very successful Yankee Fair, and Dining For Women met on 11/4 and meets next on 1/6/20; Neighbors in Need is complete; CIS is looking into participating in a "go bags" program for women fleeing domestic violence; the suicide walk was Oct. 20 with a small team from CCB participating.

Church House – Steve W. reported that they are looking for a new pest control company; Kathy and Larry are working on parsonage landscaping using \$4,300 leftover from storm cleanup; the small balance from 2018 cottage painting will be transferred to CH Designated Fund; Audrey will transfer from Building & Grounds the \$2,633.70 she believes is owed for the new phone system. **Welcome** – Beth reported Yankee Fair Welcome Booth was busy handing out shopping bags; a new banner was made and can be borrowed (it's in the library closet); the directory is in the works, and FaceBook hits are way up; there are 12-16 possible new members for Nov. 17. **CE** – Wendy reported 70 people attended the Great Pumpkin Challenge (38 pumpkins were carved and \$360 donated); the next "Gordon Ruins Everything" (date TBD) is "What the Hell? Heaven and Hell in the Afterlife"; Intergenerational Thanksgiving program is Nov. 17; Church School door decorating and Advent wreath making is Dec. 1 (pen pals will be revealed that night); Christmas pageant is Dec. 8; the Live Nativity will not take place this year. **Worship** – Bryn reported in Kathy's absence: the organ swell box has been repaired; the Ad-

vent theme was brainstormed and the theme is "Re-discovering Christmas."

Deacons – Jen reported in John's absence that all new members have been approved. **Pastors' Reports**: Jen asked that prayers be lifted up for Jeannine McCullough, Toni Sullivan, Pete Lane, Stephanie Joy, Sherrie Ruschmayer, Liz deLambert, as well as those recovering from surgery and preparing for surgery; Jen officiated 2 funerals, Gladys Grumman and Margitta Savo; Ben Wallin (who added a hand rail to Memorial Garden) was approved for Eagle Scout, and Jen signed off on another Eagle Scout project (benches at the Labyrinth); 44 care packages were sent out to college students; the Alternative Gift Fair will be held 12/7 and 12/8, with Simply Smiles, Heifer, Building Homes for Heroes, SERRV.

A Note from SERRV

We are growing again! CCB's SERRV/International Marketplace is continuing its work out in the world thanks to the generosity of our congregation and the greater community. Our Fair proceeds were the highest ever (\$5880!) and all the money we receive will support SERRV and other organizations with a message of hope and justice through fair trade.

We're excited to introduce you to our newest partnership directly with *Craftworks Cambodia.* Cambodians have suffered for decades as a result of war during the 1970s. About a third of Cambodia's population lives below the national poverty level as a result of this turmoil, and one in every 250 Cambodians is disabled. The proportion of amputees - one in every 384 people - is considered among the highest in the world.

Brass jewelry hand made from bombshells helps transform the scars of war into the beauty of peace. Craftsmen and women use the brass bombshells to create fashionable jewelry as powerful statements for peace. This symbolic jewelry offers a more positive future for the artisans and reminds us of the impressive strength that lies within so many. Craftworks Cambodia was established to provide market access for these fair trade items and we are thrilled to support this organization that promises these talented artisans a sustainable and reliable income.

Our holiday sales will be held during the Alternative Gift Fair on **Saturday**, **December 7** (10 am – 1:00 pm), **Sunday**, **December 8** after both services and **Tuesday**, **December 10** during Serendippers (starting at 11:45am).

On Offerings and Stewardship

Do you remember the final scenes of *Schindler's List?* Schindler, a Nazi Party member, purchases imprisoned Jews to work in his weapons factory. His factory, however, is making worthless weapons and his purchase of Jews is an attempt to save them from death. As the movie ends, grateful Jewish workers line up to have gold from their teeth extracted to make a ring for Schindler. Inscribed inside are the words: *"Whoever saves one life, saves the entire world."*

Schindler looks at all those he has saved and laments: *"I threw away so much money... I didn't do enough. This car could have saved ten people. This pin, two people. This cufflink, one more. I could've saved one more person and I didn't."*

We would do well to look at our cufflinks.

We ask "Why should I give to the church when I could put this money directly in the pocket of someone who needs it?" But the question is based on a false premise. We do not give to the church; we give as a church. We give as a body of people who have said that the name *Christian* is our primary identity, who discern the needs of the world with the eyes of Jesus, and then give in his name.

And, our giving should not be out of guilt or shame, but in response to our own internalization of the gospel. Lisa Hickman says it about as well as anyone: "We are able to let go because we are held on to. Our offering is about much more than our money—it is about what we let go of. It is relinquishing control and fear, because we know that in the relinquishing, God transforms [us]...To relinquish is to save a life; to hold on is to choose death. Our offering is truly a matter of life and death." (The Worshipping Life, p. 97)

As the end of the year nears, and as we prepare to pledge for the new church year, here's what I want you to know: you will never regret what you give in witness to God's goodness and grace. Let's let our giving generate a new spirit within us. Let's truly become our Father's children. In so doing, we'll trust in a new way, offer our lives in a whole new way. We'll let go of our cufflinks and coins, loan payments, personal agendas and goals. We'll lose our lives so that others might be saved. Yes, in our relinquishing, lives will be saved (and, not least of all, our own), and Christ's rule and peace will spread over our hearts and homes, our communities and world.

We only ask that you do two things: First, pray. Pray that your heart will be opened to God's grace and that your response will reflect that grace. And, second, act faithfully. The biblical standard for giving is 10% of income. But, whatever we give is to be of a level of sacrifice that it is clear that our first priority and loyalty belongs to Jesus. Jesus said that our giving is the clearest indication of our spiritual condition: *"for where your treasure is, there your heart will be also"* (Matthew 6:21).

My Blanket Story By Margitta Savo

November 1950. Thanksgiving Day. My family arrived in New York City Harbor after an arduous journey by ship across the Atlantic Ocean. We were a refugee family who had just fled Communist East Germany. My father was a wanted man for his involvement in anti-Communist propaganda. Our destination was Iowa, where a Presbyterian Church sponsored us. We knew no English. We carried only a few suitcases.

After disembarking, we boarded a train. Halfway through the journey the train encountered a blizzard. The train had to stop, and power was lost. Our family took out our blankets to wrap ourselves in some warmth. The porter walked through, checking all the passengers and stopped in front of my family. My father was taken away. Several hours **passed before he returned after all of the train's blankets were accounted for. The porter** thought our family had stolen the blankets from the sleeper cars, as they looked identical. But these blankets were given to us by Church World Service (CWS), from generous donors just like you!

Notes from the Choir Room

Choirs offer "A New Song" Lessons and Carols on Sunday, December 15th Lessons and Carols is going to look a bit different this year at the 10:30 service. In years past, we have told the Christmas story and sung carols and/or anthems that went with each part of the story. During the past few years we have shared meditations that go with each of the events in the Christmas story.

However, this summer, as I listened to the sample anthems from the various music publishing houses, I noticed that there were several arrangements of traditional Christmas carol words set to a new tune and with a different accompaniment. As I listened to these new arrangements, I realized two things. First, I was hearing, really hearing, the words in a whole new way; and second, what I was hearing was absolutely gorgeous.

So this year we will accept the challenge from Psalm 98: "*Sing to the Lord a new song!*" We will revisit several of our favorite carols in the traditional form, sung by the congregation, and in a new arrangement, sung by the choir. We will continue to have meditations based on the themes of the carols. My hope is that you, too, will discover new insights and inspirations while listening to old and familiar words sung to new and different tunes.

<u>Note</u>: Our 8:30 service on December 15th will be more traditional, with lessons and carols read and sung by our congregation, as well as our usual Communion.

Have you ever wanted to learn how to play bells?

We have had several people who have expressed an interest in ringing bells. A great place to start would be the **Glory Ringers**, which is an entry-level bell choir for anyone who reads music and would like to learn how to ring bells. We need 10 or 11 people to start this choir. If you have an interest, let me know. We would meet on Wednesday evenings at 6:30.

Therefore the Lord himself will give you a sign. Look, the young woman is with child and shall bear a son, and shall name him Immanuel – that is "God with Us." ~Isaiah 7:14 (NRSV)

I don't know about you, but as we head into Advent this year I am feeling a bit bogged down and a bit stuck. There is so much going on in our country and the world. The divides seem to get bigger and deeper between differing sides of the political aisle. The chasm separating the "haves" and the "have nots" is widening. We hear regular reports of school shootings and other violent acts and seem to look at them with passing glances and quick prayers moving on to the next thing, because they have sadly become so commonplace in our society. I read at night with my 11-year-old WWII enthusiast about that war and then support my brother as he works with Mission 22 – an organization that strives to prevent the 20+ daily veteran suicides due to the scars of war that are only sometimes visible. I read at night with my 9-year-old goofy strong daughter about young women who are working hard to change the world, and we read about climate activists who are only a few years older than her who just want a planet to survive on when they are my age. The list of issues and news headlines and things that weigh heavy on our hearts can unfortunately go on and on and on.

And so this Advent it will be important for us to come together and to think again about hope, peace, joy and love. Our Advent theme this year is "Rediscovering Christmas." How do we take something that now begins in the stores in September (no word of a lie this year), something that many of us grew up celebrating in our homes, and rediscover it? How do we look at old traditions in new ways? How do we think creatively as people of faith about being bearers of hope, peace, joy and love into a community, a nation, a world that is SO in need of those things?

We will come together this Advent season, and we will hear prophecies like that in Isaiah 7 above. We will sing and see kiddos dressed up as camels. We will baptize a baby and offer opportunities to give to others and the world. We will join around the table and offer outreach and care to those who are struggling with grief this holiday season. We will gather to hear the story again – perhaps in a new way – of a sign from God, that a newborn will come into the world who is Immanuel – God with Us.

As Anne Lamott writes in her book *Stitches*, "Nothing is larger than a newborn." In that newborn wrapped in bands of cloth we find focus – a turning toward God and God's call for us and desire to see the kingdom built on Earth as it is in Heaven. In that larger than life baby we find an example of how to share and welcome and work for justice. In that tiny little body we find the hope, peace, joy and love we need and that the world most especially needs.

We hope you will join us this Advent and Christmas season as we seek ways to rediscover Christmas, to celebrate the traditions that bind us and feed us and to explore some new things too. We hope you will join us as we strive to bear hope, peace, joy and love to one another and to God's world.
