Being Church in These Times

Before the CoVid-19 pandemic what you would have seen grace the front cover of this month's Crossways would be information about our Annual Meeting brunch which traditionally takes place on a Sunday near the end of April. However, the new guidelines for containing the viral outbreak, and hopefully keeping as many people as safe and healthy as possible, have us ***remaining socially distant and physically apart from one another through at least the end of April.***

We know this can be very difficult. God never intended us to live in isolation—from the very beginning God offered people partners and communities to surround them. However, as the church we are called not only to gather—building both faith and community—but also to care for others and the world. One of the best ways we can do that right now is by following guidelines to prevent further spread of this disease.

We hope during this time that you will stay connected with us and each other, however. We are trying many new things as we strive to offer meaningful opportunities to worship and gather virtually, as well as to stay connected via our “*View From the Earth*” weekly devotional from the pastors (available both via email and U.S. mail), this CrossWays, phone calls, Zoom meetings, and waves through the front door.

We are sending out weekly emails and links to virtual online worship. We are updating our website and Facebook page regularly with information, Church School learning options, and opportunities to participate in special virtual events. ***Please see the article inside about ways that you can stay connected with us in spirit and through the wonder of the internet while we are physically apart from one another.***

Council Notes: March 10, 2020

Moderator's Report: Personnel has completed non-clergy reviews. Personnel asks that members alert the office if they want to request Miss Debbie to staff the nursery for a CCB event or meeting.

Vice Moderator's Report: Update on FY2020-21 Preliminary Budget – Budget is still in the preliminary stage until carryover number is determined. Budget will be voted by the congregation.

FHIG –2 listening sessions were held about the potential fellowship hall project before Council met. FHIG is drafting a proposal re: next steps (poss. hiring a company to do a feasibility study).

Church Treasurer's Report: Pledge income is over budget by almost \$11k and total income is over by just over \$13k. Utilities & insurance expenses are under budget, office is over budget.

Investment Treasurer's Report: As of the quarterly report ending 12/31/19, the market value of endowment funds increased by \$83,155.25. \$2,633.70 was transferred from Building & Grounds for phone system installation; a \$4,708.70 pledge gift of stock was transferred to operating budget; 4% of the General Endowment fund will go to the Operating Budget for FY 20-21 in the amount of \$51,095.66 and 1.5% will go to Building & Grounds in the amount of \$19,160.87.

Committee Reports: CIS –Delivered \$345.00 and 17 bags of food to the food pantry from the Feeding Hungry Hearts food drive; the Souper Bowl of Caring raised over \$1,200, benefiting both Loaves & Fishes and the Brookfield Food Pantry. Dining for Women met to benefit WINGS of Guatemala and raised \$326 (total raised this past year was \$1,493).

Church House –Taken on some updates per Safety Committee's recommendation (putting a push bar on the front door out of Brooks Hall, and the installation of a lock on the door to the school wing). Purchased a TV as requested by CE for the church school wing "Apple Tree" classroom.

Welcome –Posting a Devotion on Facebook every Sunday during Lent. Church Directory photos and information have been merged, targeting a completion date of Memorial Day.

Christian Education – Marriage Course has over 20 couples participating. Confirmation recently visited 2 experiences of different faiths. Heifer program has been a good educational experience.

Worship –Increasing the substitute musician rate from \$175 to \$200. Digital piano in the choir room is in need of repair/replacement (\$3,500) – whichever avenue is chosen, there is money in the music endowment to cover it. Church Safety asked whether Worship would be OK leaving the window lights on during the services on Christmas Eve; neither Worship nor Council objects.

Deacons – There will be a commissioning and re-commissioning of Deacons and Stephen Ministers. "Plan Your Own Memorial Service" class is scheduled to be offered on May 30th.


Stewardship –Sending thank you notes to those who pledged this year. Making follow-up phone calls to members who have yet to pledge. Total pledges are showing an increase over last year.

Safety Committee – Bryn reported that the safety committee, started in 2018, has nearly completed 3 of 4 objectives re: fire safety, medical safety, and lockdown response. The last objective is to update our CE Safe Church Policy, which will be done with staff and CE guidance over the summer. The committee borrowed walkie talkies from Bob Brown to test before purchase. Ushers' locking of doors will be implemented in the fall – if there are any objections, let the pastors know.

New Business: Media Booth Modification Proposal – Request from the Media Booth Team, Worship, and Church House IT is to place a rack on the wall for better air circulation for and protection of equipment in the Media Booth, with the funds (\$2,400) to come from the Book of Remembrance (and to be voted on by the congregation). A motion was made to approve the proposed modification and send it to the annual meeting for approval. The motion passed unanimously. Same company who installed equipment will do work.

Fair Chair(s) needed –Discussed the need for Fair Chairs and several names were suggested.

CG & E requests –Motion for \$1,096.87 out of CG&E for Toni to attend the Conference of Worship and the Arts at St. Olaf College in Minnesota July 27-30, 2020. Passed unanimously.

Holy Week Worship & Meditation Opportunities



Palm Sunday, April 5th, 10:30am:

“Journey with Jesus: The Lord Has Need of You”

Wave a colored paper palm or a leafy branch from your home or yard and join us online as we gather for our Palm Sunday processional and worship.

Rev. Bryn Smallwood-Garcia will be preaching on Jesus’ triumphal entry into Jerusalem and considering the ways that God is calling us to bring our faith into the world in these difficult times. We will be celebrating communion with each other in our own homes, so make sure to have a little something ready (whatever works for you and is convenient) to join us at God’s table of grace.

Maundy Thursday, April 9th, 7:30pm:

This will be a LIVE Zoom service of Communion and Tenebrae as we hear different voices sharing the story of those last moments of Jesus’ life in physical presence with his disciples. An electronic link to join us will be sent out via email, and it will be posted on our website.

Good Friday, April 10th—Self-Guided Walking Meditation:

While we usually take time on Good Friday to join our Ecumenical brothers and sisters for a chance to witness to our faith and also to remember the story of Jesus’ last days and his crucifixion, this year we will be sharing some scripture and reflections for you to do your own self-guided walking meditation. You can do this on your own or invite some friends (perhaps even friends from other churches) to join you via Facetime, Zoom, Skype, or phone. We invite you to find your own place and space to take a walk, make some stops, and meditate on all that is going on in the world and how God calls us to respond as faithful people.



We hope you will join us for our “Virtual” Easter Celebration! Sunday, April 12th

Easter Sunrise at 6am – Pastor Bryn will share a special sunrise meditation as the sun rises in Brookfield. There will be no physical gathering, but a link will be sent along to share in the glory of the Easter morning sunrise and celebration of another day dawning.

Virtual Worship at 10:30am—Rev. Jennifer Whipple preaches *“Journey With Jesus: To New Life”* on the Easter story from Matthew 28:1-10. Especially in this time of isolation and worry, how do we hear the Easter story speaking to us—to our lives, our faith, our situations, and to the world? Where can we see new life winning over death? Where can we see and be glimmers of hope in God’s world?

When we are able to re-open, you may drop off your gently used clothing at the church office or at the Parsonage on our shop days.




Photo Directory Help Wanted

Then Jesus met [the women], stopping them in their tracks. "Good morning!" he said.

They fell to their knees, embraced his feet, and worshiped him. Jesus said,

"You're holding on to me for dear life! Don't be frightened like that." (Matthew 28:9-10, [The Message](#))

What interesting times we are living in... I am writing from my porch table in Naugatuck—thinking about the world around us, Holy Week, being separated from family and church family and friends, and about whether or not there is a way to make sense of things. And as I prepare for our Bible Study on the scripture for Easter from Matthew 28 we read twice these words, *"Do not be afraid"* or *"Do not be frightened."*

We are preparing to enter into a week in the life of the church, Holy Week, where things will look pretty good at the beginning—people in a crowd waving palms, laying down cloaks, and shouting "Blessed is He" as Jesus rides into Jerusalem, but before the week is over we will see friends gathered together for a final meal, and walk with Jesus to the cross, while the world as his followers knew it grows dark and downright frightening. So what do they do? They hunker down. They go into hiding. They quarantine themselves from the danger that is out in the world—the hatred and malice that is directed toward them, the real fear of death.

That sounds entirely too familiar...although for very different reasons. We are also going into quarantine and hunkering down—staying at home and trying to remain safe, and keep others safe. And, as those of us who are able to do that remain at home, we also pray fervently for those among our own families, church family, and others in the world for whom that is not a choice. For our essential workers—many of whom do not get paid nearly enough for the work they do. For our healthcare workers and first responders—putting their lives on the line to save the lives of others. For those who are un-housed—who have no roof over their heads— and for victims of domestic violence, where home may not be a safe place. For those who are ill or who have lost dear ones and are far from family members. We realize there is a real fear of real things—illness, financial ruin, even death. How do we look ahead to Easter morning with hope?

My hope in these last few weeks has come from everyday heroes who don't wear capes, but are doing super things. My hope comes from our Deacons who have been checking in on our church members making sure that people are connected; and from our Caring Angels who have been happy to make a run to help a fellow church family member with an essential. My hope comes from the generous souls who have donated to funds like the Pastors Fund and Brookfield Recovers, to food pantries and feeding programs, and from those who are unable to donate money so have found other ways to be generous; and from those who are sewing masks for healthcare workers, first responders, and those who have to get to appointments. My hope comes from teachers who are working their behinds off; and from our children who seem to be so much more flexible and adaptable to this new way of life and school and work. My hope comes from walking the dog and seeing the fervent desire he has to be in the world and the beautiful flowers that are unaware of the crisis around us. My hope comes from technology that allows us to gather as the church even when we can't be in one another's presence; and from the creative ways that people are using their talents to let others know that they are not alone.

We hear the words, *"Do not be frightened,"* and we are reminded that in some of the most challenging and scary times in history, God has shown up—hearing our fears, offering hope and life. As we draw closer to Easter may we keep attuned to God's presence and the ways God is calling us to bear hope and life to others...and may we respond with a resounding "yes" to that call. Stay safe...stay healthy...and be the church in the world, dear ones!

Board of Deacons

Perhaps now more than ever your Deacons are here with a listening ear and to offer care and support. Our Deacons have been checking in with their branches, so hopefully you have heard from your Deacon over the last few weeks. - a need for prayer
- a request for help (transport to a doctor's appointment, church function, etc.)
- a sorrow (illness, accident, death)
- a joy (a birth, graduation, upcoming wedding, etc.)
- something that particularly pleases you, or would better meet your needs in the worship service.

Remember, if you don't know your Deacon, ask someone to introduce you. He or she will look forward to meeting you – in church or out!

Jim recently visited the PushPay app on his phone and found that giving this way can be very easy. You can easily download the app at the Android Play Store or Apple App Store. **But you don’t even need to download the app to give.**

Scroll down the Menu to: **Give**

Scroll down to: **Give Online**, then click on **Pushpay**

You’ll be given a few questions about the amount and type of gift you are making, then you’ll be sent a confirmation code. If you already have an account, you’ll be automatically logged in. If not, you’ll be given prompts to set up an account and provide a source of electronic payment (bank or credit card).

Pushpay may offer an easy way to continue your giving. During this difficult time, your financial support is valued and appreciated more than ever. You can also contact your bank and ask for your pledge to be fulfilled through automatic bill pay.


Again, we thank you for continuing your giving during this crisis – our church depends on faithful donors like you to keep our ministries active even as we are temporarily separated from one another.
